Mary (Dargel) Stagaard, Goodwell, Oklahoma, formerly of Greensburg, Kansas, is now a teacher at Guymon, Oklahoma. She holds a bachelor's degree in Music. Most will remember Mary as being very active in KWHHA for many years. She has also won numerous awards in rodeos, such as barrel racing and Queen contests. Mary showed under the Greensburg Rattlesnake Saddle Club. Many will remember Mary as a very fine horsewoman and showing the best in sportsmanship in her years of showing.

Having as her first horse, a shetland pony named Peanuts, she performed at rodeos. She won her first trophy at Meade, Kansas in 1954. She showed three years before trophies were awarded and has collected over 400 trophies, 1500 ribbons of blue, red, yellow and green, buc-a-brac, such as blankets, halters, bridles, breast straps, hats, and certificates. Also listed are other winnings by Mary, fourth place, National High School Rodeo 1961, pole bending riding Lucky, a saddle at Buffalo, Oklahoma 1958 rodeo, a saddle as high point winner in KWHHA awards in 1962, as Miss Jr. Queen at Dodge City Siesta in 1958. She was crowned by TV personality Michael Ansara. She has had State recognition for 10 years, and in the top

10 money winners in 1961 and 1962 in barrel racing. She was KWHHA State Show Queen (Jr.) in 1959, Senior Queen in 1962, Queen of 1959 Jaycee Rodeo, Queens attendant at the 1961 Arnett, Oklahoma Rodeo and also won the barrel races. In 1960 she was champion barrel racer at the Wichita Jaycee Rodeo. She was high point winner at the KWHHA State Show in 1959, 61, 62, and 63. She is holder of 28 high point trophies.

She and her husband, Wayne make their home in Goodwell, Oklahoma. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Dargel reside in Greensburg, Kansas. She still owns several horses, Peanuts (her first horse), Silver Lady, Madge, Lucky, and Rowdy. She has ridden in Kansas, Oklahoma, Colorado, Texas, New Mexico, Montana, Wyoming, Missouri and Nebraska. Truly this young lady deserves recognition for her riding ability, her sportsmanship and her occupation.

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History of the

K S H A

During September of 1940 a number of horsemen were at the Kansas State Fair in Hutchinson where they had brought their saddle horses for exhibition. Some were quite bitter that there was no place to properly show their horses except up and down a crowded road in front of the horse barns. Others called attention to the fact that \$2,000 in prize money was being offered for the draft horses and only \$150 for saddle horses at the official Kansas State Fair. It was suggested that the horsemen of the state should organize their own proper organization.

Soon afterwards a number of meetings was held and the Kansas Saddle Horse Association was formed. The main objectives of the KSHA are: 1. To promote the education of the people of Kansas in the breeding, care, use, handling and development of horses and horsemanship. 2. To encourage good sportsmanship and proper conduct among horsemen and horsewomen and to foster good fellowship among all persons interested in Saddle Horses. 3. To encourage proper and humane handling and care of horses, to prevent cruelty to animals. 4. To assist in establishing a horse show circuit in the State of Kansas and to encourage a horse show at the Kansas State Fair.

EQUINE HEALTHSENSE

The season is now upon us which will produce a crop of future colts, and very soon after they arrive, the time for getting next years business prepared. Many questions arise in regard to the length of time a mare should carry her foal and the problems associated with reproduction. All pregnancies must begin with a heat period and the presence of a stallion. Some mares seem to have problems with their cycles and have variable signs to present to their owners and veterinarians. Long constant in season signs, very short signs, or no sign of heat all are brought to the attention of owner and veterinarian. These problems quite often are due to the interference of man in to nature's unbeatable method of survival of beast.

Picture in your mind the habits of the horse running free in bands upon the vast prairies before man started tagging confinement and records of birth dates upon each mare and foal. The natural habit of the mare once was to come into breeding season only in the spring when the grass was getting green and the temperature was safe for a foal to be brought into the world without the shelter and filth of a barn. Lack of exercise and improper nutrition, too much or too little, are very important in the reproductive health of a mare and stallion.

Many have observed and some are guilty of very foolish and improper methods of mating the mare and stallion. So many times it has happened that it is almost thought to be the only way, and that is get the mare to the stallion when she switches her tail or shows the slightest interest in another horse or when the calendar says a certain date. Load the mare in the trailer and head for the chosen stallion, unload her and twitch her, get up nerve enough

to let the fierce stallion out of his cage and with all of the very unnatural conditions, the mare is covered. In the human race there are laws and penalties for such acts of violence. The fault certainly does not rest with the mare or stallion but the very person on the equipment of restraint. Pasture breeding is the closest method of reproduction to nature's way. Some do not have pastures, some say they don't want their stallion to get hurt. If a stallion doesn't know enough to leave a mare alone until she will accept him, he needs to learn. Every animal has its own method of making love and the presence of a chain and twitch were not attached to either sex until man appeared.

Veterinarians in equine practice have the training to determine when a mare is near her ovulation time. This is best done by daily or every other day examination. Complete history of heat signs and foaling date are beneficial in arriving at the time most likely for acceptance of the stallion.

The person who thinks that "a shot" is all that is necessary along with a twitch to get a mare bred is almost always right. However, most people in the above picture really want the mare to conceive and reproduce a healthy foal. A live viable sperm and an egg getting together at the proper time in the proper place in the absence of disease should certainly get credit for a foal, NOT THE SHOT AND THE TWITCH.

Normally the mare will have heat periods of 4 to 6 days in the spring. The sperm will live an average of 4 days in the healthy uterus. So the breeding of the mare twice in one day is completely useless and every other day not really

Make plans now for the NSCA show in Littleton, Colorado, July 11-17. From all the information received there will be quite a few clubs representing Kansas at the Nationals. This is very good for Kansas to be recognized for horse showing and also for our own Kansas Western Horseman's Association of approved horse shows.

The National has passed a new ruling that each state can have for every 10 clubs a National director but each state can only have 3 directors. The KWHHA board of directors will elect the National directors this year. At the KWHHA fall meeting this year the directors will elect the directors for 1968.

The film on the 1966 National show, which was taken in Billings, Montana has been shown several times and to several clubs individually that didn't get to make the Spring King Off Dance. Everyone seemed to enjoy seeing it.

The clubs that belong to the National Association and are having the Pole Bending and Key Race events, for the high point trophy and ribbons, can go ahead and have them in KWHHA age groups. They can also be sent to the National for record and to our own KWHHA secretary to be recorded for our own points. Although, if someone rides the events and does not belong to the National, they may win 1st for the local show but can not be sent to the National for record there. The only times recorded is the best two times regardless of age groups.

The 1967 NSCA rule books are now being printed in Natoma, Kansas, the same printer that printed the KWHHA rule books.

The 1967 O-MOK-SEE show bill should be out next month. I'm sure we are all waiting to see it.

necessary. The average estrus cycle is 19 to 24 days.

Seasonal factors in the form of daylight length, temperature, and nutrition continue their regulatory effects on the breeding mechanism into the breeding season by influencing the length of the estrual cycles and the fertility of mares.

The length of the gestation period of the mare generally is accepted in the horse breeding practice to be 336 days, and can range from 320 to 360 days.

Sleeping Sickness and Tetanus vaccination season is here. With the presence of Infectious Anemia, a different needle should be used on each horse. No disinfectant will destroy this virus. Be safe!
