High Points Awards For Year 1968

Each year the Kansas Western Horseman's Association awards high point honors to top contestants in each of its five age groups or divisions. These awards are based on points tallied throughout the year at approved association horse shows. The awards are well earned when considering the great many contestants in competition for such honors.

In the 1-9 group: Debbie Wilt, Santa Fe Stables of Pratt, won top honors with brother Ronnie Wilt winning the honors in the 10-13 age group. Debbie with 344 points and Ronnie with 267 tallied almost exactly two-thirds of the Santa Fe club's points for the year. With these two contestants and others in the club, they finished in 3rd for club high points.

From the Sandhill club of Hutchinson, Eddie Hamilton took the honors in the 14-17 age group with 209 points. Karen Russell, also of Sandhill, took honors in the ladies division with 280 points. This club finished on top

for total points with 2,220 points. Rock Warren, Derby Silver Dollar club, won the awards in the men's division with 178 points.

The Leoti Rough Riders finished in 2nd place with 1,454 points. In 4th was the Hill City Pioneers with 832 points and in 5th was the Mulvane club with 775 points.

EQUINE HEALTHSENSE

The show season has come to an end with the finals and many a fine animal has suddenly become a fixture that requires daily attention. In fact there were a few of these good animals at the KWHA finals that had been fixtures and not in training for some time before the season ended. This discussion and the problems some of these horses incurred at the show are better known as "tying up" syndrome or mild azoturia.

The pattern most horse or pony owners have in regard to feeding will have great effect upon the incidence of azoturia. For example, you feed 1 gallon of mixed feed night and morning and a small flake of good alfalfa once a day and all the good prairie hay your horse can eat. This becomes habit during the summer when you or your kids are using your horse several days during the week and every weekend.

Harold Shoemaker, Esbon (Ionia) 786-3385 School starts and the weather changes and old Dobbin finds himself getting a rest and still the same amount of feed. Suddenly he gets a little fat and soft but still can do a good job of running or riding if asked to. Since the regular work has suddenly dropped and the feed has remained the same, there are certain acids which form next to muscle fibers when the horse is made to work. Excess acids form usually 10

to 30 minutes after exercise begins and symptoms develop.

The most common symptoms are muscle rigidity and lameness affecting the muscles of the croup or loins, accompanied by pain, patchy sweating, disinclination to move and a little later, brown or coffee colored urine. Colic must be differentiated from tying up. In a colic case it is best to keep a horse moving and exercising and just the opposite is best for a horse tying up.

To prevent tying up, the best concept is to feed your horse good before you work him and reduce the feed content when he is just being stalled and not ridden. This condition is very similar and possibly related to the old work horse condition called "Wonday Morning disease". This name is very descriptive when one realizes the whole picture. The habit of feeding a work horse was the same as previously discussed and the amount of feed was the same on Sunday as the rest of the week only the horse usually just stood in his tie stall while the family went to church and on to grandmothers house for the rest of the day.

Monday morning comes and to the field we go to plow corn or what ever work is in season. Suddenly the driver sees one of the team lagging and he shakes the lines or snaps the whip to equalize the load because no one likes to see a loafer. This may happen again rather suddenly and probably the same situation repeats then suddenly the horse quits and starts sweating rapidly. This condition of too much feed in relation to the work is the cause. Feed your horse heavy the meal before work begins and not after the work is done.

The treatment by your veterinarian will be successful providing too much damage to the muscles or kidneys has not occurred.

Sheplers Build New Western Establishment

WICHITA, KANSAS . . Super structure will be raised for a 20,000 square foot retail store adjacent to present Shepler facilities on U.S. Highway 54 west of Wichita.

J. Robert Dry, president, says that the finished Shepler facility will be a unique store where the rancher or sportsman and his family can shop complete lines of clothing, hats, and boots, as well as horseshoes, saddles, and western, racing, and English tack. Founded shortly after the turn of the century, the business has been known as Shepler's since 1946. It is advertised as the world's largest western department store.

Southwestern architecture is being used for the new building. The exterior will be of white stucco, cedar timbers, and Spanish tile. A stucco and cedar fence will surround the area. Cottonwood trees will be included in the landscaping.

Shepler's western gear and wear itself will serve as the decor for the interior. A huge woodburning fireplace and southwestern relics will serve as background. A balcony will contain the company offices.

The landscaped parking facilities will include special provisions for stock trucks and trailers. A farriery and a corral where horses in transit can be exercised are being considered for inclusion on the grounds.

The existing building will be remodeled to serve as warehouse and mail order center. The mail order facilities will incorporate the very latest systems for handling orders from throughout the world. Construction and remodeling will be completed by the start of 1969, according to Dry.

Judges Arise! Make yoursolvos worthy of the title by doing some studying AGAIN and by choosing a winner on his merits on that day, not because he won under someone else. We need you, and you need our support if you are going to continue to get shows. Out youngsters are very fair . . . they are the first to know and to say so if they didn't do a good job. The least we can be is be fair
